

In 2013 the New Jersey State Library, in association with LibraryLinkNJ, the NJ Library Association and the National Network Libraries of Medicine - Middle Atlantic Region, initiated a Disaster Recovery Summit called 'Ports in a Storm' for libraries throughout New Jersey. The WDFPL is participating in the initiative in order to better serve the West Deptford community when emergencies occur. Scratch helps young people learn to think creatively, reason systematically, and work collaboratively - essential skills for life in the 21st century. Scratch is a project of the Lifelong Kindergarten Group at the MIT Media Lab. It is provided free of charge.

For Parents

Scratch is a programming language and an online community where teens and tweens can program and share interactive media such as stories, games, and animation with people from all over the world. As students create with Scratch, they learn to think creatively, work collaboratively, and reason systematically. Scratch is designed and maintained by the Lifelong Kindergarten group at the MIT Media Lab.
